

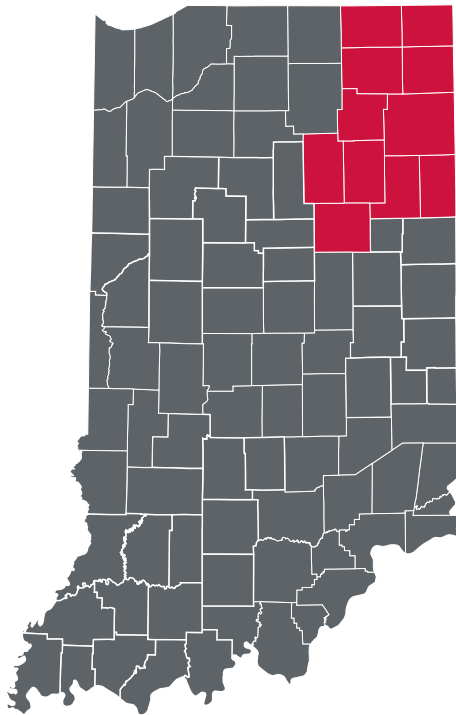

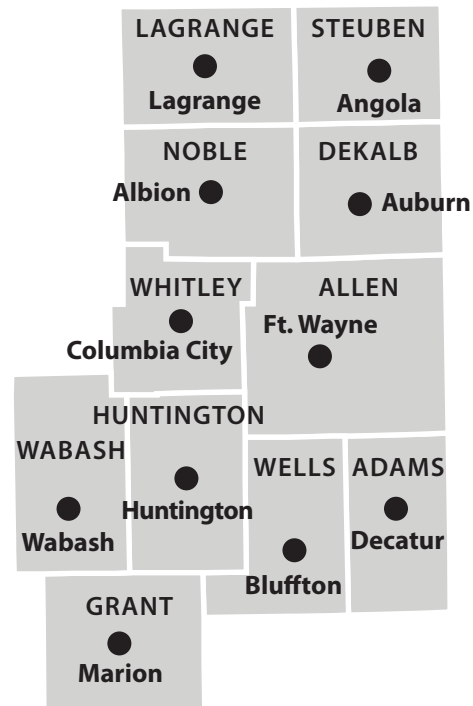

Rural-Urban Continuum Code Rating

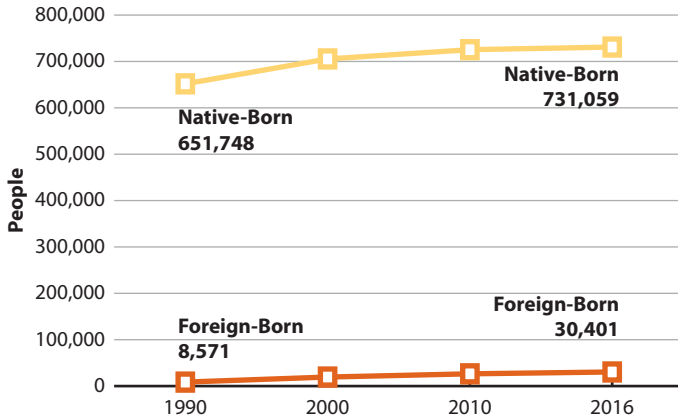
Economic Research Service, USDA | Rural-Urban Continuum Codes (RUCC) distinguish metropolitan counties by the population size of their metro area (1-3), and nonmetropolitan counties by their degree of urbanization and adjacency to metro areas (4-9).

County	RUCC	Description
	1	Counties in metro areas of 1 million pop. or more
Allen, Wells, Whitley	2	Counties in metro areas of 250,000 to 1 million pop.
	3	Counties in metro areas of fewer than 250,000 pop.
DeKalb, Grant	4	Urban pop. of 20,000 or more, adjacent to a metro area
	5	Urban pop. of 20,000 or more, not adjacent to a metro area
Adams, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Wabash	6	Urban pop. of 2,500 to 19,999, adjacent to a metro area
Steuben	7	Urban pop. of 2,500 to 19,999, not adjacent to a metro area
	8	Completely rural or less than 2,500 urban pop., adjacent to a metro area
	9	Completely rural or less than 2,500 urban pop., not adjacent to a metro area

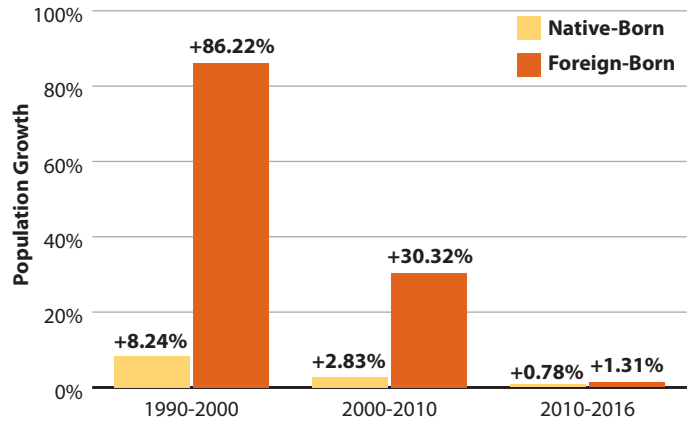
Native and Foreign Population, 1990-2016

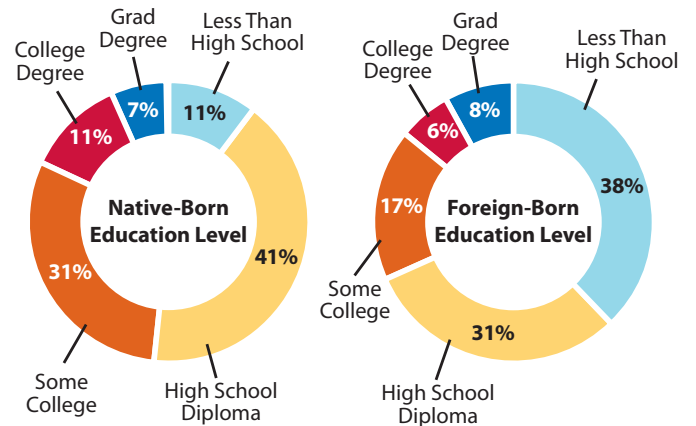

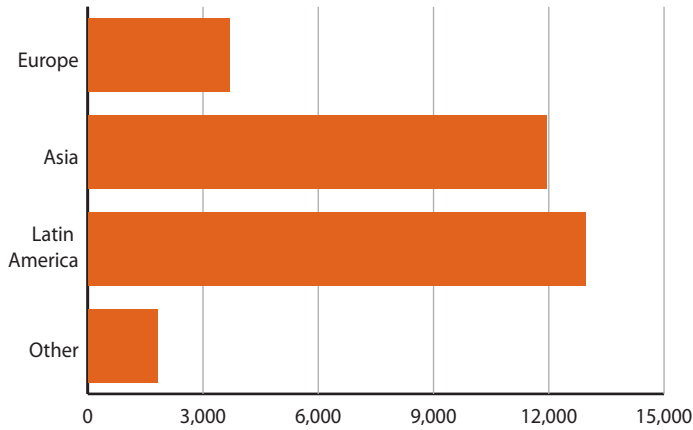

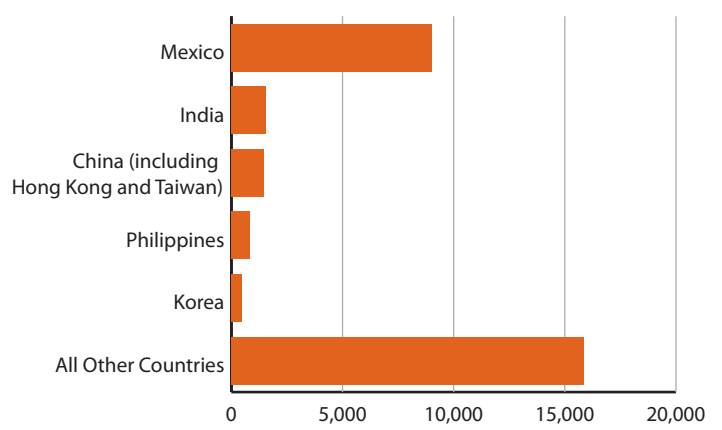
Region of Birth for Foreign-Born Population

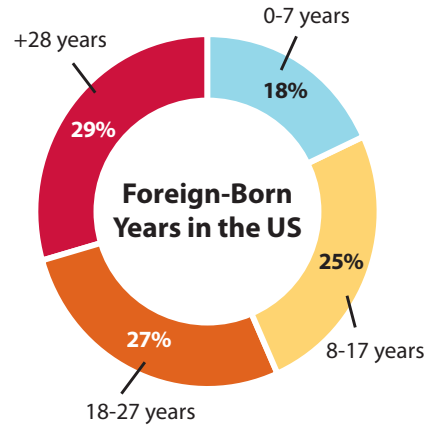
